Analysis of Rule of Law Situation

- Misbalance of power among government branches
- Good laws in place in general, but implementation the problem
- Problems with inconsistency across pieces of legislation
- Lack of institutional infrastructure
- Lack of institutional capacity

Some preliminary conclusions

- Monthly coordination meeting held at Helvetas since August 2009
- Mapping of RoL activities and LACs maintained by Helvetas
- Detailed coordination among agencies going on in some sub-sectors, e.g. support to JTC
- Little activity in some sub-sectors, e.g. work with courts and prosecutors
- More input needed from a broader number of agencies/donors (including from business/commercial side)
- No (very little) infrastructure support

Deficiencies in Rule of Law as affects the population

- Low level of access to justice
- Low level of legal knowledge and rights by individuals
- Low level of public discussion of issues
- Low level of trust in the justice system
 - BUT increasing due to inputs from projects

Donor Coordination amongst themselves

- Avoids duplication, fills gaps, and builds synergies
- Discussion of long term goals and objectives and how to achieve them
- Most projects only a couple of years and dabble in an area, i.e. do not cover the whole spectrum of need
- Effective use of resources
- Coordination of policies and not just activities

Donor Coordination with the Government

- Government is interested and requesting support
- Need to fit with Government goals and objectives and how to achieve them



What is lacking/needed?

In order to have a good understanding of the needs of e.g. the justice sector...

- Infrastructure diagnostics
- Functional review
- Assessment of funding needs of the system
- Assessment of how funding is used in the system
- Budgeting in the sector

No technical reviews of this nature exist to date.

The way forward?

- Policy dialog between the donors and the Government on rule of law
 - Use JLRP as a launch board
 - Emphasize importance of rule of law for economic development
 - Encourage Government strategies to include rule of law
- Large scale sector review and support
 - Moves the country forward
 - Supports the smaller, target interventions
 - Contributes to sustainability
- Continue donor coordination
